The only thing holding us back from bringing more willing food packers was the limited supply of food. FMSC is at the end of their fiscal year and had to ration the amount we packed.

race member, Jessica Jacob was among those who packed meals on Saturday. She shared her story: I have been a bit stressed from work and life, and last week I prayed, 'God, what is the plan, because I am not sure what to do anymore.'

Then Saturday came and we arrived at FMSC. I felt the blood pump through my veins when we watched the introductory video. Then laughter filled the room when our team packed meals together. I felt so ALIVE; to see the young and old working together to make a difference in someone else's life was amazing!

Afterwards, we watched another video that showed the difference we are making in the lives of those who

Lenten Journey: Then and Now

The 40 days of Lent are one of the most important times of the year for people of Grace. It is traditionally a period of meditation, prayer and spiritual renewal among intentional disciples of Jesus. It is a time to slow down and prayerfully reflect upon **the final portions of Jesus' life as he** approached the cross of Calvary.

his year our focus centers on our weekend worship as we reflect upon the richness of the Old Testament promises God made with his people: Noah, Abraham, Moses, and the Israelites as they wandered in the wilderness. Their stories will challenge us to consider that although God made promises of love, protection, and guidance back THEN, he still promises the same love, protection and guidance to us right NOW! Each worship service will be foundational step for Lent, provide a concrete Biblical lesson and inspire worship to help us prepare for Easter.

In addition to weekend worship, we will offer Wednesday evening Holden Vesper Services at 7:00 p.m. featuring the popular *Nooma* teaching series by Rob Bell. These services are a great mid-week spiritual "shot-in-the-arm" for the whole family! Children (3 yrs.– 5th grade) are invited to our Mid-Week Bible Club beginning at 6:30 p.m. Catechism students and parents are encouraged to share in this Lenten Journey together. It's a wonderful way for parents to model a deepening faith for their children! In order to help people make mid-week worship a priority, Grace offers Lent Suppers from 5:30-6:30 p.m. The menus are tasty and served by Grace ministry teams. A freewill offering covers the costs.



Grace offers a daily devotional entitled: A New Perspective-Reflections 2009 by Pastor Ryan Peterson of St. John Lutheran Church in Ellisville, Missouri. This is a wonderful way to set your mind on God's perspective each day as you journey through these 40 days of Lent. In addition, we are offering a brochure entitled Keeping A Holy Lent which explains what Lent is about, suggests how to observe it, and explains the important days of Holy Week such as Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil. The Lenten devotional and brochure are available at Grand Central in the narthex at Grace.

One of the special Lent opportunities from last year will be offered again. Grace will host the ELCA Prayer Labyrinth on Saturdays from 1:00-4:00 p.m. through March. No appointment is needed.

A Prayer Labyrinth is one of the oldest contemplative and transformational tools known, having been used for hundreds of years for prayer, ritual, initiation, and spiritual growth.

Back in medieval times, prayer labyrinths were often viewed as

a journey to Jerusalem and were called Chemin de Jerusalem (Road of Jerusalem). They served as a spiritual pilgrimage for those who could not afford to travel to Jerusalem, the center of the world.

Lent is a journey of challenge-a challenge to grow in appreciation and thanksgiving for the steadfast love of God shown in the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Therefore, we are asking everyone at Grace to consider the following:

- Read a devotional such as A New Perspective−Reflections 2009. Copies are available in the Grand Central area in the Narthex (lobby)
- Regularly attend weekend worship
- Get Join us for a Wednesday Lenten Supper at 5:30 p.m. through March

ur Lenten journey continues Wednesdays through March. We will provide Lenten Suppers starting at 5:30 p.m. This is a great chance to connect with other families at Grace, and you don't have to cook!

On Wednesday, March 4, children will begin in worship with their parents and will be dismissed from the worship center to have their own children's sermon and activity.

On Wednesdays, March 11-April 1, children are invited Mid-Week Bible Club for a fun Lenten experience. Bible Club starts at 6:30 p.m. and children are invited to hear a Bible story, play games, sing songs and make a craft. Children ages 3 years old through kindergarten will gather in the daycare playroom (room 110) at 6:30 p.m. Children ages 1st grade through 5th grade will gather in the naproom (room 111) at 6:30.p.m.

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ELCA Prayer Labyrinth at Grace during Lent

"I pray that out of His glorious riches He may strengthen you with power through His Spirit in your inner being" (Ephesians 3:16).

What is a labyrinth?

Simply put, a labyrinth is a prayer path, a tool which can enhance your prayer life and aid you in deepening your relationship with Jesus. It is a means of quieting the mind and centering one's thoughts on God. Coupled with deepening your intention to be in the presence of God, it becomes a sacred Prayer Labyrint space, a place of prayer and holy encounter. Labyrinths are ancient tools that have been adapted for Christians for meditation and prayer. They are universal in the way that there is only one path to the center. Rather they produce a calming, soothing and peaceful experience to draw you into God's presence.

Walking through a labyrinth

- Relax and clear your mind of distractions and any expectations you may have
- \mathbf{R} Follow the path staying in the lines
- 🛯 Notice how you feel
- 🛯 Walk at your own pace

- ∝ Linger in the center if you wish
- Retrace the path to the exit
- R Every prayer walk is different and the effects may come to you along the journey or even weeks later

This labyrinth we will be using was a project of the 2001 Youth Gathering in St. Paul. Youth and adults added their favorite Bible verses and thoughts to the fabric pathway.

Pastor Mark's Remarks

The Elaborate Family Bible

It never fails. I can be in a real "funk," feeling overwhelmed and stressed to the max and then go to my Adult Bible Survey Course and get rejuvenated and energized.

Ithough the 20-plus people in the course are lots of fun and good friends, I don't think it has much to do with the people. And I'm pretty sure that it doesn't have to do with the teacher (that's me, of course!) for I've known him for years! What I really think is the incredible impact that God's Word has on me when I intentionally study it and appropriate its truth.

As we begin our Lenten Journey, it seems most appropriate during this time of special spiritual renewal that we challenge each other to grow in this area we often neglect—studying God's Word, our sixth habit of effective disciples.

Pastor John Underhill of Valley Fourth Memorial Church in Spokane, Washington, writes about discovering the importance of the Bible in the life of a certain Christian lady: "In January, 1984, I was painting the home of an 89 year-old lady in Spokane. She had a large family Bible prominently displayed on the coffee table and remarked that this priceless heirloom was 116 years old. I commented on how remarkable that was, and added, 'It doesn't matter how old the Bible might be, what's on the inside is what matters.' She immediately replied, 'Oh, I know. That sure is the truth. Why, we have family records and births and

marriages and deaths that go so far back, all recorded in that Bible; we could never replace them.'"

This story reminds me of a childhood friend whose elaborate family Bible was placed on the coffee table of his home. As long as I can remember, I didn't see that the Bible opened, moved (except for dusting) or used in any way.

In conversations I've had with people over the years, they tell me the main reason why they don't join a Bible study is a lack of knowledge. Although many want to learn more about it, there is a fear of being "called on" for an answer or feeling "lost" in a discussion; this hinders them from a class or learning event.

I find this most interesting. In our recent "REVEAL Spiritual Life Survey Report," we discovered that the single most important "spiritual practice" that advanced a person's spiritual growth is the "*Reflection and Study of Scripture.*" Unfortunately, the number of people at Grace who regularly read and study the Bible is considerably lower than the national average.

I wonder whether people truly believe that Scripture can impact and challenge a person to reach outside themselves to grow their faith. In addition, I wonder whether people think that the Bible is irrelevant to their lives today. Do people believe that "something written thousands of years ago has little or no impact on their lives in this modern world?"

If this is the case, then I invite you to our 2009 Lenten Journey: Then and



Now! Each weekend we will focus on an Old Testament story, explore the spiritual meaning, and how it surprisingly relates to our lives today. Some stories may be familiar; others may not. But as we look at Noah, Abraham, Moses, the Israelites, and Jeremiah, I promise that you will find fresh insights for today that will challenge you to grow.

During our Wednesday evening Vespers services, we will explore the thought-provoking Nooma DVD series by Pastor Rob Bell. Will you come and explore these titles with us?

Tomato: Where do we derive our "self-worth?"

Store: Living with Holy Discontent in our lives may lead us to make a difference in life!

Open: Does God answer prayer?

Name: Should we "compare and despair?"

Shells: Are we too busy? What are we really doing with our time?

So...crack open your Bibles! Get ready to study! No matter if you're in a "funk," feeling overwhelmed, or stressed to the max, come and get rejuvenated and energized! We're going to grow our habit of study this Lent!

Lent, a time of relinquishing and giving...up

e've been talking about 'giving' during February and now with the Lenten season upon us, we should be talking about 'giving up'! Lent is a unique time of year that gives us license to stop, breathe, take time, just be, and listen. But before we can do that, for most of us it means intentionally saying no and giving something up in our lives.

It might be our frantic schedule. It might be our faithful commitment to every single sports event little Susie or Johnny is in. It might be an over-thetop-afraid-I'll-lose-my-job attitude to our work in this lay-off crazy world we find ourselves in. It might be our obsession with a particular TV show (or shows). It might be our fixation with spending hours on end in front of a computer screen as we search for some deal; connect on Facebook; or email jokes to friends and families! It might even be part of our daily routine that gets in the way of our faith walk. Or anything else that takes away from spending time with God.

It all begins with taking stock in where we're currently at in our faith walk. How much time do we spend with God? Do we intentionally plan on spending time with Him? Do we hear from Him on a regular basis? Wouldn't you like to do that? Just like Seven Habits of Effective Disciples Worshipping Serving Praying Giving Sharing My Faith Studying God's Word Building Vital Friendships

being more generous, I think we'd all genuinely like to spend more time with God. But, for many of us, we just don't know where to start.

Here's a good place to start—The Bible! How's that for a novel concept. Bible reading is our habit of effective discipleship we'll be focusing on during March. So as we give something up and free up some time, we could actually spend more time in God's Word. In addition, studies show that reading the Bible is one of the primary ways we can accelerate our spiritual growth.



What I learned that first summer and many summers afterward was that God truly loves me for me. It wasn't because I was good at something, but despite all of my faults, He Loves Me.



Vision Board Summary

Our February Vision Board meeting focused on a Power Point presentation of the results of the Reveal Spiritual Life Survey. The presentation was given by Johnna Hirt, co-chairman of the Focus 20/20 team.

Reveal Spiritual Life Survey was used to classify spiritual growth along a continuum. Our goal was to determine where Grace members and attendees are in their spiritual growth and how to equip individuals for their spiritual journey.

The four categories of spiritual growth are "Exploring Christ", "Growing in Christ", "Close to Christ" and "Christ-Centered".

- CR25% of the participants were "Close
to Christ" and "Christ-Centered"

- Spiritual growth is dependent upon a **person's relationship with Christ**
- Most participants were satisfied with their spiritual growth and Grace's role in their growth

The three main catalysts for movement along the continuum are: 1) spiritual beliefs and attitudes; 2) church practices; and 3)spiritual practices.

Areas that Grace will focus on are relational connections through gift-based empowerment; worship services; and children/youth programming.

The Focus 20/20 team will present their findings to Grace members and attendees the evening of Friday, March 27.

On Saturday, March 28, we will invite the stakeholders to share their ideas of how to put our findings to use. We would like at least 75 people to attend these sessions.

Karen Erickson submitted the financial statement for January 2009.

Golden Rule Child Care Center has openings. The child care center has consolidated children into two rooms and has cut staff hours. Grace is discussing to lower the age of day care participants and allow non potty-trained toddlers to attend the child care center. This would increase attendance and income. An additional sink will be needed to accommodate this.

The Minneapolis Area Synod Assembly will be held on May 29-30. We are part of the Northwest Conference, and our assembly is on Sunday, March 15 at 2:00 p.m. at Word of Peace in Rogers. Two congregants are needed to represent Grace. ■

Reminder: Keep giving for mission needs ...but don't forget our capital expenses!

The Grace budget, as of a year ago, has mission investment needs and capital expenses separated out to accurately reflect the different expense areas. Mission investments include expenses such as: programs; staff; and other regular operating costs. Capital expenses cover the mortgage; building improvements; and any other costs related to the building and ongoing improvements.

For those of you giving to both, please continue making your contributions to both mission and capital. For those of you only giving to mission (regular operating costs), please consider giving also to capital needs as well, but please don't decrease your regular giving! Rather, pray about giving above and beyond that amount for capital.

For the 2009 Grace budget, total mission investments are \$862,306 and total capital expenses are \$121,500.

Please remember our ongoing capital needs as well! ■


Thrivent has a program called *Giving Plus* in which they will add \$1 to every \$2 contributed to an enrolled organization, in accordance with their program guidelines.

Focus 20/20 Envisioning Process

Our Spiritual Continuum REVEALed!

Last fall Grace asked its congregation to take the REVEAL spiritual life survey, and almost 250 people generously gave their time to take the survey and provide us with invaluable input about how we can help each other grow spiritually. We are very grateful to those who participated.



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hile the results are a wealth of information about who and where we are as a congregation, one very interesting aspect of the results was seeing where we fall on a spiritual continuum developed over the course of surveys of more than 500 churches. This continuum of development lets us see how we compare to other churches but more importantly provides a baseline that can help us measure our growth against ourselves.

Here's what the continuum seeks

to tell us. It charts where survey respondents are in one of four stages of development as Christians (see diagram above):

Each box represents a category of development and the percentages

show how the people of Grace who took the survey fell into each category. The arrows show how we stack up to the sample as a whole. Upward arrows show that we are higher than the sample total, and downward arrows show we are lower. The number of arrows demonstrate the degree that we are out of sync with the total sample. For example the two arrows pointing **upward in the "Exploring Christ"** category show we have way more attenders in this category than the sample as a whole.

The results for Grace suggest that we have many opportunities to foster spiritual growth. We are more heavily represented in the first two areas and less well represented in the last two, the ones with the greatest spiritual maturity according to the survey. As the REVEAL authors noted, "we found much stronger beliefs, more routine spiritual disciplines (e.g. daily Bible study), and greater frequencies of spiritual behaviors (like serving those in need) as people advanced from one segment to the next." In other words, the more we advance along the continuum, the better we can embody God's presence in our community.

From the standpoint of our Focus 20/20 effort, we are looking for ways to help people at Grace advance along the spiritual continuum. Providing the means to help the 77 percent of Grace in the first two categories grow and deepen their faith is a high priority for the church. The REVEAL tool also suggests catalysts that can help people advance along the continuum. We will be exploring some of these with you in the coming weeks as we continue to develop a vision that reflects God's plan for us at Grace. ■

The next few months will be like the climax to a great movie, and you won't want to miss it!

There will opportunities to connect with the refinement of the Focus 20/20 envisioning process and build new roads to uncharted territory. The more we participate in the process, the more familiar this map will be to each of us, and the better we will understand our personal role. Striving to establish comfort and confidence with our spiritual development will breed contentment and hope regardless of what life throws at us.
